onciliation, pursuing those who have strayed from the truth. Why? Because he cares — he cares more than we do about the people we know who are "lost sheep" or "lost treasures" like the coin in this parable.

Think of the people who have been lost to you because they have abandoned you. God cares and is pursuing them to bring healing to the relation-ship, and he will continue his efforts even until they take their last earthly breath (sometimes healing comes after death).

Think, too, of people who are neglecting their faith. Jesus is a Good Shepherd who will a Good Snepherd who will never give up pursuing them. Why? Because their value to your family and to the Church is important! Their absence is depleting the strength of the

And God, who is the source of the life of the community, is doing everything possible - well, even the impossible - to lead them to repentance, healing and a safe return.

However, we cannot leave it all up to God. He works through us. Only when we've tried and our influence is nil does God say, "Let go. Trust that I am continually working on the problem." We can believe that Jesus is



still chasing after them, even though they hide from him. He is not far from them, even though push away,

If there is something else we can do to invite them back into the sheepfold, but we don't, someday we will have to explain to Jesus why we didnave to explain to Jesus why we did-n't. Why did we fall to love as much as he loves them? Why did we let them stray away without researching how we could help them? Have we done anything to push them away?

No matter how difficult it gets as we partner with Christ to bring others back to the sheepfold, the most important thing we can do is keep loving them unconditionally. Hopefully, they will see in us the love that Jesus is offering to them.

Reflect & Discuss:

- . Who are the lost sheep and missing treasures of your family and your parish community? What will you do to reveal Jesus and his merciful love for them?
- Is there a parish ministry or an evangelization program that you could join to learn how to better help others turn to Jesus?
- When the lost are not ready yet to turn to Jesus or return to us or to the Church, how do our attempts to give them Jesus prepare them for an eventual conversion?
- Why is it worth trying, even if we don't see any fruits for our efforts? Even if it includes sacrifice and extra humility on our part?

ST MARY'S - ST. PATRICK'S CEMETERY GUIDELINES

September 1, 2022

The following guidelines are in effect as of the date above and must be observed.

- 1. When an occasion arises that "<u>burial privileges</u>" must be used, the Pastor is to be notified. In the event that the Pastor cannot be reached Richard Cochran should be contacted directly. In the event that Richard Cochran cannot be reached then Jim Larkin should be contacted.
- 2. All grave spaces in the new section of the cemetery are to be sold in rotation. (A grave space size is 4' x 10')
- 3. Effective September 1, 2022 the cost of a grave space in the cemeteries or niche in the columbarium shall be as follows:

GRAVE SPACE

Parishioner grave space – \$400.00

Non-parishioner grave space – \$600.00

The sale of a grave space to another person or persons is strictly prohibited

COLUMBARIUM NICHE

Niches will be sold on the East and West side of the columbarium, left to right, top to bottom. Each niche can hold only two cremains. The initial engraving, death date engraving and veteran medallions on a niche are the family's responsibilities. All engraving will be "Times New Roman" font and must be done by Wommack Monument Co. (Wommack Monument Co. can temporarily or permanently seal niche for family when doing death date engraving.)

Parishioner Niche - \$800.00

Non-Parishioner Niche - \$1,000.00

The sale of a niche to another person or persons is strictly prohibited.

There is a <u>one-time</u> fee of \$300.00 per individual for on-going maintenance of the cemetery at the time of a burial. <u>This applies whether it is buried cremains, cremains placed in a niche or a traditional burial. Cremains must be buried or placed in a niche in the columbarium. The scattering of cremains on a grave or in the cemetery is strictly prohibited.</u>

All prices are subject to change without notice.

- 4. ALL PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS of grave spaces by the erection of monuments, other than ordinary stones and military markers, must be submitted to the proper authority (the Cemetery Board) before being carried into effect.
- 5. **NO** planting of any kind is allowed in the cemeteries. For example: planting trees, flowers (with the exception of crocuses), shrubs, as well as embedding flowerpots, statues, etc., "on" graves are prohibited.
- 6. There are to be no flowers etc. on the ground during mowing season, (April through September) except for Memorial Day. All flowers, natural or artificial, must be removed two weeks after Memorial Day if they are on the ground and NOT in permanent vases that are attached to the base of the headstone. If left on the ground in the way of mowers and weed eaters they will be removed. This includes all figurines, flowers, decorative rocks, and any decorative items such as shepherd hooks, solar lights etc.

All items such as glass jars and vases are prohibited due to the fact that if they are broken they could possibly cause injury.

Veteran and Knights of Columbus flag holders are allowed and can remain.

- 7. Every new grave should be marked with a permanent headstone if at all possible. All stones must be in line, and must meet the Cemetery Board's specifications. Headstone footings must be 16 to 18 inches deep and the same size as the base of the headstone or concrete pad (apron). Footings for Military or V.A. and infant marker footings can be a little less. The width of the monument or stone must not exceed the grave space size. If you are unsure about the grave space size, please contact the Cemetery Board. Monuments or markers must not exceed a maximum height of 42". (The base of the stone is included in the 42".)
 - A. All V.A. markers shall be flush with the ground and located at the foot of the grave, so that mowers will pass over the marker without damaging it. This does not pertain to V.A. markers that are attached to an upright marker or used as the main headstone.
 - B. Infant markers should be at least 13 inches wide by 6 inches deep minimum.
 - C. Prior to setting any stone or monument Richard Cochran must be notified. In the event that Richard cannot be reached then Jim Larkin should be contacted. One or the other or a member of the Cemetery Board must be present at the time the stone or monument is set in place.
 - D. <u>Benches in the cemetery are prohibited.</u> <u>Long ledgers that cover the entire length of the grave are also prohibited.</u>
 - E. All monuments and markers are to be maintained by the family.
- 8. The Cemetery Board reserves the right to make any additional changes as required or as needed.
